We continued to pay the salaries of two support staff at a local hospital serving in a region where health care is challenging. We also partnered with a like-minded organization and brought clean water to a community. And finally, we continued to traveling to Haiti, kept learning, loving

support a local Pastor as he shared the Good News to his Haitian brothers and sisters. All these accomplishments could not have happened without your faith-

Espwa started as a small group of people (3), who were so impacted by time spent in Haiti, they got together and asked, "How can we make a difference?" We started with a medical focus as we supported a small medical clinic in village that had no access to

health care. Then we took a few medical trips with medical professionals. back. We kept "showing up" and brought people along to meet some really special people and visit a beautiful country. There's no grand moment or miracle that happened. Of course we learned so much along the way - how couldn't we? In fact, I'm embarrassed by what we used to think was "helpful" to our friends in Haiti. However, we kept telling the stories of our friends, kept

and serving as best we knew how. We've increased our impact through various projects and continue to seek out new opportunities.

10 Years of Impact in Haiti

The dream to form ESPWA began when each of the founders had their own experiences visiting Haiti. Jennifer visited for the first time in 2006 with her church. While there, she was deeply moved by the number of children living with basic ailments that can easily be treated in the US. There was little access to quality health care and so the vision for St. Anthony's Clinic and how it could impact the community was formed. Jennifer's church


funded the construction of the Clinic and St. Anthony's opened its doors in 2008. Chris visited Haiti for the first time in the fall of 2007 and served at EBAC Orphanage. Joe visited in 2009 and later that year, all three met and discussed how they might work together to help the people of Haiti. In 2010,




Joe & Chris coordinated a summer camp for kids at EBAC and then soon after, The ESPWA Foundation was formed.

For the first couple years, the organization worked to define its role in the community and how best to direct its limited resources to

serve both the medical community and families. Chris visited the Peace & Joy Orphanage in 2012 and felt led to be involved in a greater way. At first, the decision was to support the orphanage itself, but after a year, it became apparent that ESPWA could best support the kids at home with their families and so the orphanage was closed and the Peace & Joy Family Project was born. Later in 2012, ESPWA led its first semi-annual medical trip with doctors, nurse practitioners, nurses and other passionate friends to serve. In 2013, the first event-based

meant additional support for new communitybased needs in Haiti, St. Anthony's Clinic, and the ongoing building of New Hope Hospital.

In 2014, ESPWA invested in its first small business, Haitian Creole Tour. In 2015, the program expanded to include long-term grants for students. ESPWA got a face-lift with a new and improved website and led two groups to Haiti from Pittsburgh-area churches.




In 2016, ESPWA hosted a 'Poverty, Inc.' screening in Pittsburgh and formed its first Pittsburgh Marathon Team. Later that year, New Hope Hospital opened and an ESPWA-led medical team visited in the fall. In 2017, donor software was added and ESPWA was featured in a CNN Online op-ed.

2018 was a tremendously busy year with the addition of new projects including the support of Pastor Benjamin's Hoshama Ministries, the partnership with New Roots farming initiative, and


the first taxi (tap-tap) investment. Chris led Duquesne Pharmacy students on a service-learning experience trip. The "Ride the GAP" cycling event launched and for the first time, ESPWA raised over \$100,000. It also received the GuideStar Gold Seal of Transparency.

In 2019, the volunteer-led Board held its first planning retreat, hosted the "Hoops for Haiti"

fundraiser, and passed \$500,000 in total cumulative revenue. In 2020, ESPWA became a BBB Accredited Charity and added another small business investment with 3-wheeled moto taxis. A new partnership was formed to begin a clean water initiative and a house for a family of 10 was completed!







2020 Fundraising Activities

Like countless other nonprofits, Espwa was required to scale back its fundraising efforts in 2020. In August, the third annual Ride the GAP shifted from a three-day bicycle trek over the Great Allegheny Passage (that's the "GAP") to a single-day ride in observation of social distancing and other COVID protocols. Twenty riders participated, and together raised over \$10,000 for the Espwa general fund. In late October, Executive Director Chris Pfeiffer got back on his bike for a metric century ride (that's about 62 miles, for those of us still on the imperial system of measurement). Centuries are a big deal for cyclists, and so was Chris' for Espwa: with his day-long effort, he shattered his fundraising goal and brought in \$6,374.04. To cap off the year, Medical Director

Jennifer Schmidt coordinated
Espwa's first ever Giving Tuesday
campaign. Typically, Giving Tuesday
happens on the first Tuesday after
Thanksgiving. Jen's fundraiser,
conducted over Facebook and the
Espwa donor platform, yielded
\$1,212.06 that will be used to
support St. Anthony's Medical Clinic
in Cap Haitien.

Ride the GAP and the successful "Hoops for Haiti" events plan to return later this year. Stay tuned for all of the 2021 opportunities! Thank you for your continued support of our events and initiatives.
